FROM THE DIRECTOR

The patience and hard work of the last few years culminated in 2025 with the expansion of the Teen Room and the installation of three small individual study rooms. Staff showed once again their resilience in working in difficult and changing conditions during the construction. Our study rooms proved to be an instant success and the Teen Room opened with much excitement just in time for the busy summer reading season.

Staff also were busy seeking new ways to connect with our patrons, and within our community. Jennifer Gage shined with the newly debuted Sunhat Storytimes for children at the Valley Cottage Hamlet Green; That new offering joins our existing On the Trail walking book club for adults at Congers Lake. Carida Ridoré, Head of Children's Services, along with Nyack Library's Director Tracy Dunstan presented a poster session about the successful Nyack and Valley Cottage Libraries Community Spotlight: BIPOC Businesses event weekend at the American Library Association conference in Philadelphia, PA; This program was also honored by being selected for the RCLS Adult Program of the Year award. Katrina Hohlfeld, Head of Teen Services, led a session at the annual Fall into Books conference. Jennifer Kenny submitted a successful STEM grant to Orange & Rockland to begin a Tiny Engineers club at the library. These spotlights are but a few examples of how the entire staff shined throughout 2025 and gave their hearts to the community.

On a beautiful October Sunday, a newly installed bench was dedicated to Tom Protus Sr. who passed in 2023 after dedicating more than 50 years to watching over the Valley Cottage Library. This bench, and its twin, were the result of the efforts of the library's Sustainability Committee collection and recycling of more than 2,000 pounds of plastic.

The look back on the year is gratifying to remark on how much gets accomplished with the convergence of dedicated staff, a devoted board, and a supportive community. Thank you for the opportunity to stand at the center of these constituencies along with our dedicated Assistant Director, Ashley Maraffino. As an Association library, the Valley Cottage Library a not-for-profit educational corporation supported by the public and administered by a seven-member executive board of trustees. Any Valley Cottage resident, 18 years or older and a registered voter is a member of the Association.

Members attend the annual meeting each January and are eligible to run for any open trustee positions on the board and to vote on the operating budget prepared by the board.
