2023 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY



FROM THE DIRECTOR

There is so much to be proud of at the Valley Cottage Library. While the preceding year was not easy for anyone working at the Valley Cottage Library, the challenges were met with dedication, kindness, and determination to continue our mission to deliver high-quality library services but to also push ourselves and each other to excel and elevate our services.

In February 2023 a flood caused by a broken sprinkler pipe damaged nearly 5,000 sf of usable adult collection and seating space. Within days of the event, over 30,000 library materials had to be moved and stored to access and remove the wet carpet. For months various contractors from many trades were in the library addressing the damage to the sprinkler system, electrical system, carpet, walls, lighting and shelving. For over five months there was never a day without a decision, disruption or distraction. This catastrophic event coincided with a complete roof replacement and the accompanying noise and disruption to building access, programs, and quiet.

Fall of 2023 saw the implementation of the *For Future Reference* internship program which was an initiative under development for nearly two years. This program sought to introduce a career in libraries to upper-level high school students who may be traditionally underrepresented in libraries. Working under the guidance of the Diversity committee, our staff developed a 10-week program whereby students learned foundations of library careers, shadowed each of the library departments and produced a capstone project. Everyone who had contact with the students, or the program agreed that the program was not only successful but had meaning and value for both the students and the mentors. The Valley Cottage Library is proud to be the first library in our region to offer this type of opportunity for students.

The Valley Cottage Library staff are proof that with the right people with the right mindset, wonderful things are possible (even during a flood recovery!). While closing the doors or maintaining the status quo could have been a reasonable choice during this time, the Valley Cottage staff aspired to greater service and imaginative thinking to overcome and elevate in a year that impacted us all.

The Valley Cottage Library Association is served by a seven-member Board of Trustees who have shown through my two years of tenure to not only be dedicated with their time but are invested in tackling the challenges head on to protect and strengthen our library today and for all the days ahead. The success of our library lies in the oversight and counsel given by board members in 2023.

2023 changed us, and we are all the stronger for having risen to every challenge.
